The most prevalent type of light is daylight, and since photography translates to "writing with light," many photographers often find it somewhat "boring." They prefer to capture subjects in more beautiful and unique moments. Of course, this perspective is subjective and based on personal taste.





When the sun starts to lower, this is the start of the golden hour. At first, it can look pretty white, but...





As the sun descends, the sky takes on a more vibrant yellow hue, provided certain conditions are met. Typically, this occurs when there are no clouds on the horizon, and any clouds present are situated only above it.





As the sun dips below the horizon, provided that specific conditions are met—typically a clear sky and certain cloud coverage—you can witness a stunning array of colors such as orange, yellow, and magenta. This moment is often considered the most beautiful part of the day.





Other examples





The blue hour is one of my favorite times of the day. It occurs just after sunset when the city lights begin to illuminate and the sky hasn't completely darkened yet. I refer to it as the "magic window" because the contrasts are subtle, allowing for stunning photography.

The great news is that even on overcast or clear days, while you might miss out on a perfect golden hour or sunset, you're likely to achieve a beautiful blue hour. This technique was very valuable during my book project on London, especially given the numerous overcast days. The photo above of Tower Bridge showcases this perfectly.



The night sky isn't my preferred, as the contrast can be rather strong. Typically, I find there isn't much detail to capture, which leads me to stop my photography for the day. However, there's a thrill in what we refer to as astronomical skies. This experience involves venturing into the wilderness, away from light pollution, to photograph the sky or the Milky Way. An example of this is the photo I took at Zion National Park in May 2025.

The beautiful sky can feature unique weather phenomena, such as the mesmerizing aurora borealis, which I captured while in Iceland.



BLUE HOUR



As the cycle begins anew before sunrise, you experience another blue hour. When night fades, the sky turns blue while the city lights remain partially illuminated. I captured this shot at 5:30 a.m., which isn't easy for me since I'm not really a morning person!





The sunrise closely resembles the sunset, but with far fewer people around since they are still asleep. For instance, I could never have captured this photo without the crowd typically present at sunset. Additionally, during sunset, especially in urban areas, there tends to be more dust and particles in the air, which can enhance the intensity of the colors.

3 DEADLY SINS WHAT NOT TO DO IN SKY REPLACEMENT



When the sky is not as you hope it is, it is very tempting to change it. This was shot at the blue hour, which is after sunset.







If I put a sky of a sunset, something is wrong. In real life, the scene would be much more balanced; it would be backlit, and the buildings should be more washed out. The building lights would not be on. This sky is too early; we need to replace it with a sky taken at the same time but better!





This is a blue hour sky that has been replaced, aligning perfectly with the time. Occasionally, if certain types of clouds are present, they can take on a magenta hue during the blue hour.







This is another mistake; the photo was taken in the afternoon, and adding a sunset doesn't align with reality. In a genuine sunset, you wouldn't see strong shadows in the foreground; instead, it would appear completely dark. Viewers will instinctively sense that something is off, even if they can't quite articulate it!







Another example: the original sky appeared dull, and adding a sunset didn't quite fit; in reality, the girls would look much darker. I replaced the sky with a beautiful, bright daylight sky, and now it looks much better. The key rule is to swap the sky with a shot taken around the same time but with a more appealing appearance!













Sunrise Tunnel View in Yosemite

During my visit to Tunnel View in Yosemite for sunrise, I found then I got a very dull sunrise. The sun was still low on the horizon when I shot this. If I were to replace the scene with a sky where the sun is higher than the mountains, it wouldn't make sense, as it would light up parts of the valley. However, if I choose a sky where the sun is still low and the clouds are illuminated from that position, it creates a more compelling image.











The Las Vegas Night Sky

Changing the night sky to reflect a sunset doesn't quite work; it creates an odd contrast with the city lights. Instead, you could opt for a night sky filled with clouds. While this may not make a significant difference, at least it maintains a sense of accuracy.













It's evident that there are two suns; while the replaced sunset is beautiful and improved, having two suns does not work well, even if it's not very noticeable.



Now I took a sky and moved the sun around to make it match the other original sun position much more naturally. I was hired by the Mayor's office of Las Vegas to do drone photography of the city.














STEP 2 In the menu go to Edit → Sky replacement






STEP 2 Default the last sky you used will be there





STEP 3


Click on the sky and it will open a new window with some skies






STEP 4

Increase the size of your window and the size of the skies so you can see better






Optional: If you have new skies to add, click on the [+]






Select all the skies you want to add; you can press CTRL A to select all.





All your skies will now be forever in your photoshop










Pick a sky that was TAKEN at the same time but BETTER and you can adjust the brightness and the temperature to match your image






To add reflections, select the sky layer and press COMMAND J on a Mac or CTRL J on a PC to duplicate it.






Then, right-click on the sky and select "Unlink Layers." This will ensure that they are independent from each other.






Next, right-click on the sky mask and choose "Delete Layer Mask." This mask applies solely to the sky; however, we will utilize that sky for reflections.






Select the sky layer, then press COMMAND Ton Mac or CTRL Ton Windows. Next, right-click and choose "Flip Vertical."






While pressing shift, drag the sky over the water now it has been flipped and mirrors the top






Above the layers put the bottom sky in multiply mode this will blend the color better






On a Mac, hold down the OPTION key, or on PC, press ALT, and then click the Create Mask button. This action will generate a black mask, effectively making the reflection vanish. Keep in mind that in Photoshop, black conceals while white reveals when using masks.






Press B for brush and then make sure the opacity is at around 25%.




Press D to make sure that your foreground color is white





Brush the bottom of the photo until the reflection is there, and then save and close the photo. It will come back into Lightroom with the sky replaced by the reflection. Well done!






Select the photo and if you are in Lightroom Classic right click and click edit in Luminar Neo






Select the photo and if you are in Lightroom Classic right click and click edit in Luminar Neo






STEP 2 Click on edit at the top and then on skies at the right side






If you want to add skies like we did in Photoshop, click on the Sky selection button and choose the options Show custom skies





This will open a folder; simply drag and drop your files into that folder, and voilà—they will be stored there permanently!


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
Go to the sliders on that window and find the reflection and adjust it to your liking. I usually put it all the way if the water is very still, and less if there are a bit of waves.
